Free access to the Internet is universal in U.S. public libraries. On average in 2007, there are 10.7 public computers in our libraries - compared to 5.7 a decade ago.

54.2%

Libraries serve even more people with free wireless access. More than half of public libraries offer wireless, up from 17.9 percent only three years ago.

About two-thirds of U.S. public libraries offer high-speed access (769kbps+) to the Internet, which draws many computer users, including those with Internet access at home
